# Message from the President

In my mind, there are two worlds. There is the world we want to live in, and there is the world in which we actually live. Keeping these worlds divided has become a difficult if not impossible task, especially when I consider the issue of guns and schools.

Personally, I don't want to live in a world where we need metal detectors in our PreK-12 schools. I also don't want to live in a world where a first-grade teacher gets shot by a six-year-old in class. But here we are. From Newport News, Virginia to Pickerington, Ohio to our own ammunition issue at Onaway, there are ever increasing numbers of stories about gun presence and gun violence in schools. And as Columbus legislators continue to remove restrictions on open and concealed carry, and attempt to install people with only 24 hours of gun safety training in our schools, I realize how irresponsible it is to pretend the real potential of gun violence in our schools is not increasing exponentially all around us. I also consider myself a fairly well-balanced thinker on the subject with both family and friends who own guns, serve in the armed forces, and are police officers who work with guns on a regular basis. Many of them question the proliferation of ever more lax gun restrictions that seem to be sweeping our state in particular.

In this time and place, with a Governor and Ohio Legislature that seems to be progressively stripping common sense gun safety from our laws, I believe it would be equally irresponsible to *not* imbed metal detection in each of our buildings. I have read the counter <u>arguments</u> about the relative ineffectiveness of metal detectors, but that doesn't stop them from being ubiquitous in nearly every public building in the <u>state</u>. I would also argue that even a small deterrent to weapons and ammunition being brought into our schools would provide an extraordinary added value. I also know that modern technology such as Wide-Area Metal Detectors (<u>WAMD</u>) and other camera-based detection methods don't prevent like the metal detectors we see at airports and sports arenas. Finally, school systems not far from our own have chosen to shift to this preventative measure after gun violence occurred in their <u>schools</u>.

It would be irresponsible at the juncture, in this time and place, to pretend to live in the world in which we want to live. We have to live in the world that we actually inhabit right now. It's time to make metal detectors a part of our holistic approach, along with social emotional support, to make our students and schools

as safe as possible. Maybe one day we can remove them like the old manipulatives and text books from the past, but I would rather us make the effort than to consider the "should haves" should the unthinkable occur.

It's been a busy month. I spoke weekly with Superintendent Dr. David Glasner. I also spoke weekly with Human Resources Director Tiffany Joseph. I updated the SHTA Facebook Page with Publications Editor Andrew Glasier. I worked with Special Education Chair Tito Vázquez on Member Issues. I communicated with Boulevard Head Representative Cathy Grieshop on a safety concern. I collaborated with Personal Rights and Responsibilities Chair Mike Sears on a grievance and members' concerns. I worked with MS Head Rep John Koppitch and Legal Aide Chair Jeremy Bishko on member concerns. I worked with Evaluation co-chair Lena Paskewitz, Addie Tobey, and Andrew Glasier on evaluation issues. I worked with MS Head Principal Michelle Hughes to address a member concern. I assisted a member with a legal issue. I attended a successful Winter SHTA Happy Hour planned by Social Relations Chair Selena Boyer. I helped with sick day transfer for a member. I communicated with SHTA legal counsel Susannah Muskovitz on member concerns. I worked with Onaway Head Representative Paula Klausner on member concerns. I assisted a member with an FMLA issue. # EXECUTIVE BOARD REPORTS

#### PROFESSIONAL RIGHTS AND RESPONSIBILITIES REPORT

During the past month, I attended the SHTA Social at the Academy Tavern, the SHTA Executive Board and Representative Council meetings in February, and I plan to attend the Insurance Committee meeting on February 23.

After reviewing the administration's disposition from a Step II grievance hearing on December 6, both the member and the SHTA Grievance Committee decided to move to Step III. Attorneys for both the association and the administration are currently in the process of selecting an arbitrator.

Middle school head building representative John Koppitch consulted with me about a disciplinary issue at the middle school. I worked with SHTA President John Morris and John Koppitch to resolve questions from members at the middle school about the teacher evaluation process. I assisted a member with questions about job sharing and reduced time schedules. I spoke to a member with questions about voluntary transfer requests. I listened to members who are concerned about dental insurance not covering all procedures, especially wisdom teeth extraction and anesthesia. This issue will be discussed at the Insurance Committee meeting on February 23. I spoke to members about both maternity leave and paternity leave. Expectant mothers should review Maternity Leave Considerations. These slides can also be found on the right side of the Insurance and Benefits website.

Please be aware of the following reminders and clarifications of evaluation protocols:

- All observations should be completed by May 1, 2023
- All evaluation conferences, final summative ratings, and pinning should be completed by May 10, 2023
- Lesson observations should be scheduled at a mutually agreed upon time between the evaluator and the educator. This is true for all lesson observations during Full-Cycle and Off-Cycle years. The "informal" observations, a.k.a. walkthroughs, may be unannounced.

Please refer to the <u>Evaluation 2022-2023</u> slide deck for detailed information and resources. Be sure to utilize the resources on slide 26. The "Navigating OhioES" videos may be of particular help to those who are having trouble.

As always, I am here to help answer questions and navigate any part of the evaluation process with you, as are all members of the committee.

#### **POLICY COMMITTEE**

Our Association's constitution consists of Articles and By-Laws that govern our operations, along with a Special Policy that we use as a mitigation to solve problems and lessen conflict. It reads:

#### SPECIAL POLICY POLICY FOR SOLVING PROBLEMS

- A. We expect our members to take part in any conference so long as the educational needs of the child remain the focal point of that conference. If the conference is to be held outside of the normal school hours, then the member must be agreeable as to the time.
- B. If a situation arises in which it is no longer possible to maintain a conference in which the educational needs of the child are paramount and there is no administrator present to terminate the conference then our member, with as much decorum as possible, should inform the other party involved that the conference is terminated for now and will be resumed if the other party so desires, when our member is able to secure Association/legal representation and/or the presence of an administrator.
- C. If in a conference between a parent, member and administrator a situation arises in which it is no longer possible to maintain a conference in which the educational needs of the child are paramount, then our member, with as much decorum as possible, should request that the conference be terminated until such time as the member is able to secure Association/legal representation. The administrator should honor such a request.
- D. Remaining in a conference that has degenerated into a forum for the leveling of undocumented charges cannot in any way serve any legitimate educational need and will only serve to make a future solution to the problem more difficult, if not impossible. A cooling-off period is needed. This is what we hope will be accomplished by terminating the conference.
- E. As a professional association we have a dual responsibility: First, we must do everything possible to ensure that every member recognizes and assumes his/her professional responsibilities; Second, we must also insist that our members be treated as professionals at ALL times. We will support them with all our resources in this effort.
- F. We would hope for the support of the central administration in our efforts to seek educationally sound solutions to problems that arise as we deal with the many complexities involved in our efforts to fulfill our professional responsibilities. However, we will continue to advise our members to terminate all negative conferences, to allow for a cooling-off period, and we will ensure that the member will have Association/legal representation at any future meetings. We do not seek to avoid the public. What we hope to accomplish is to ensure that an atmosphere conducive to the solution of problems on the highest level possible shall be maintained at all levels.

# **DIVERSITY, EQUITY & INCLUSION COMMITTEE**

African-American History Month reveals how much we do *not* know about our American history. As I share with my students, American history is everyone's history. One term that is often overused is Uncle Tom. In the black culture it often means a sell out, however, it is anything but... African and Black History archives share the real Uncle Tom, who was an asset to our race. Josiah Henson, who was the inspiration for Harriet Beecher Stowe's *Uncle Tom's Cabin*, was an abolitionist who was a leader in getting enslaved African Americans to freedom. He was born in 1789 in Charles County, Maryland. He was an eyewitness to atrocities against his family. As he aged, he would not snitch on slaves, and he added cotton to their bags to prevent the plantation owners from whipping the slaves. He became trusted and would oversee other enslaved. He used his position to aid in in the Underground Railroad, freeing many from Maryland to Ontario, Canada. Later, he worked to support his family and founded a settlement and school for other fugitive slaves and became a minister, while serving in the British Army in Canada. When you hear someone calling an individual an Uncle Tom, stop them and ask why. In reality, Uncle Tom is a compliment and note that it was Sambo who was the real sell out. Sambo would do anything to get the plantation owner's approval. Uncle Tom is someone to respect and honor.

This month I would like to share the book *Dear White American: Letter To a New Minority* by Tim Wise, an anti-racist author who confronts the racist belief systems that permeate United States culture. "Wise confronts the white fear of losing cultural hegemony, on the one hand, and the politics of resentment that has been both a real and contrived source of right-wing power in national politics. The book is aimed at a reasonable audience who may describe themselves as 'not a racist,' but whose assumptions about race and social power make them underestimate or misrecognize racism's persistence in the US ". *Book News* 

As we look at our school calendar for next year, it is refreshing to see that an additional religious day observance has been added. Eid al-Fitr or the Festival of Sweets is the earlier of the two official holidays celebrated within Islam. The religious holiday is celebrated by Muslims worldwide because it marks the end of the month-long dawn-to-sunset fasting of Ramadan.

#### SICK DAY TRANSFER COMMITTEE

Middle School teacher Heather Sterby has exhausted her sick days and will fall into unpaid status. As a member of the Sick Day Transfer Program, she is eligible to receive donations directly from members who are eligible to donate sick days. To be eligible to donate sick days, an SHTA member must meet the following criteria:

- The total of an employee's sick leave donations to all recipients may not exceed 10 donated days per school year.
- Only employees with an accumulated sick leave balance of 20 or more days may donate more than one day per school year.
- Employees with fewer than 10 sick days may not donate at all.

If you are interested in donating sick days to Heather and you are eligible based on the above criteria, contact Jessica O'Brien at Obrien\_j@shaker.org. You will indicate the maximum number of sick days, up to 10 maximum, that you wish to donate to Heather while she is enrolled in the Sick Day Transfer Program. *You will not donate all of these "pledged" days at once, nor will they all be taken from your sick leave balance immediately.* These days will not be taken from your sick leave balance until they are actually to be transferred to Heather. As donations are requested from the Treasurer's office, the chair of the Sick Day Transfer Committee will arrange transfers such that the total number of days taken are distributed evenly across all members who wish to donate. For every 2.5 sick days donated by our members, Heather receives one sick day

#### LEGISLATIVE COMMITTEE

The Statehouse News Bureau <u>reports</u> on the impact that Governor Mike DeWine's proposed budget will have on public education. The proposed budget expands the voucher program for private and charter schools through the *Ed Choice Scholarship Program*. Originally this program was designed for impoverished families, but the proposal would let a family with an income of \$120,000 use the scholarship. The Plain Dealer <u>reports</u> that the current threshold is that family income be below \$69,375 and would go up to \$111,000. Opposing this change are the Ohio Federation of Teachers, and the Ohio Education Association.

The Ohio Capitol Journal <u>reports</u> that Governor DeWine signed HB 554 into law. The statute makes it easier for people who have left teaching to reinstate their licenses. Ohio is facing a significant shortage of teachers, and while this new law will help a bit, no one expects that the new law will be enough to eliminate the shortage.

The New York Times has several articles that <u>cover</u> Florida's Department of Education banning of the Advanced Placement course on African American Studies.

#### Legislative-Dave Klapholz

- The Statehouse News Bureau reports on the impact that Governor Mike DeWine's proposed budget will have on public education. The proposed budget expands the voucher program for private and charter schools through the Ed Choice Scholarship Program. Originally this program was designed for impoverished families, but the proposal would let a family with an income of \$120,000 use the scholarship. The Plain Dealer reports that the current threshold is that family income be below \$69,375 and would go up to \$111,000. Opposing this change are the Ohio Federation of Teachers, and the Ohio Education Association.
- The Ohio Capitol Journal reports that Governor DeWine signed HB 554 into law. The statute makes it easier for people who have left teaching to reinstate their licenses. Ohio is facing a significant shortage of teachers, and while this new law will help a bit, no one expects that the new law will be enough to eliminate the shortage.
- The New York Times has several articles that cover Florida's Department of Education banning the Advanced Placement course on African American Studies.

November 17, 2023 will mark the five-year anniversary of Aisha Fraser's passing. As a sixth-grade teacher at Woodbury, Aisha had a gift of making math accessible and interesting to all of her students. She spent several years as an enriched math and core math teacher. At the same time, she served as director of the Granville Academy, a student-centered school that provides flexible, personalized education. It was important to Aisha to work with all children to provide the mentorship and opportunities needed to have a successful life.

During the 2017-2018 school year, Ms. Fraser supported the Woodbury Female Scholars by providing tech support for our National Geographic Society research project. She opened her classroom to our scholars and gave them valuable instruction on using video to tell important stories. The research being done was important to her because the students wanted to propose an accessible playground at Woodbury. As the mother of a child with Down Syndrome, she knew how important accessible playground equipment was for these children.
